Universal access to education, with special attention to closing the gender gap in primary and secondary education; and

In September 2000, world leaders adopted the Millennium Declaration, from which emerged the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). The MDGs set clear targets for reducing poverty, hunger, illiteracy, disease, maternal mortality, discrimination against women and environmental degradation by 2015. The recent UN report card on the MDGs found that gender equality is essential to achieving the MDGs, and gender equality cannot be achieved without guaranteeing women's and girls' sexual and reproductive health and reproductive rights.
